COMMODORE'S CORNER by: Andy Beggs, Commodore



What the heck happened? At first, I didn't realize we had wiped out. Our euphoria of a great start at Balboa Pier had long worn off, and I was tethered in at the pulpit of Triggerfish for the spinnaker hoist. I couldn't see or hear anything other than the roar of a 24-knot breeze, the rushing water and the frantic and violent slapping of the partially full spinnaker. We were several hundred yards to the weather of the Coronado Islands, about 2 hours after sunset. The cloud coverage was very

thick, and visibility was about as close to zero as I've seen in a long while. Despite being so close to the island, you can only sense its presence...like a gravitational force. So what now? The hoist had gone awry...spin sheet was intertwined with lifelines and or all the other rigging and jack lines. I could vaguely make out a yell to get the lazy sheet pulled around to replace the fouled port side sheet, so I pulled it around. Unfortunately, by then we had rounded up and were moving sideways/backwards downwind.... right onto the island. Not great. I heard a yell from Brandon (Folkman) to lose the kite. Then a lot more yelling requesting help. Not sure what was going on in the back of the bus, but it sounded urgent. Then the kite started coming down from the mast and into the 9' swells of the Pacific Ocean. I knew one thing for certain, which is we could not afford to shrimp this kite if we expected to avoid going onto the rocks. Somehow this giant spinnaker had to come down. One piece or 20, it had to get on the boat. I often joke that my core competency is reaching the top shelf. There's another one: sail retrieval. Long arms can corral a spinnaker and wrestle it into the hatch. Lankiness, desperation and an assist from Rob Moody was just what we needed, and we were back to being a sailing vessel again, all-be-it a bare headed one. I yelled about hoisting the genoa, and Brandon pointed out we were doing 8 knots already.... not much more the genoa was going to do for us. We can take our time, so we did. OK, so I messed that up pretty bad. I'm not much of a bowman, but sometimes I must do it....and this is what happens. Sub-optimal. BUT we were OK and racing. Brandon was almost pulled through the clutch on the spin halyard drop but he wasn't. Rob Moody was almost swept off the boat but he wasn't. Joe Bell, Kevin Cammiso and Matt Bartley could have gone over in the wipe out, but they didn't. An Experienced crew figures out how to survive and stay on the boat. And get back to racing. Now what? First, we decided to hold off on spinnaker hoists. Back to the genoa: moving very fast still...10 knots at many times....We had already fully committed to the outside route of the Newport to Ensenada race, sowe just have to keep going. Head for Todos Santos, make the turn, and come in hot at the finish. The wind predictions (which were completely wrong) did say no wind after 3 AM. We had 6-8 which died down to about 5 right at our 5:32 AM finish.... Our race was complete! Time for Margaritas and waiting in the Mexican customs line. Hindsight being 20/20, we clearly should have just gone rhumb line. BUT, that's the beauty of this race. You must start with a plan and then figure it out from there. I've lost this race so many times by abandoning an outside strategy, come in too early, and get stuck floating aimlessly on the Mexican coastline. We didn't let that happen to us, but rhumb line was the call this year. Yes, I botched the kite hoist. That is a regret that I'll have until we do this race again and I redeem myself. This is how we win: Great people, great adventures, great competitors. King Harbor Yacht Club!

NEW VESSEL TO OUR FAMILY- An Introduction to PHANTOM

Albin Boats was a Swedish boat builder that specialized in the design and manufacture of fiberglass sailboats. The company was founded in 1899 as a builder of marine engines and produced its first boat in 1929. Albin Yachts focused on the marine engine business before moving into boat building, initially, only building sailboats. When entering the world of powerboats, they began with the Albin 25 Double Cabin, introduced in 1969. The company sold their brand in 2008. (Wikipedia.org)

In 1899, Lars Albin Larsson founded Albin Motors in Kristinehamn. The pivotal moment arrived in 1964 when they made a significant shift in constructing its own fiberglass boats. The first of these was the Vega 27, introduced in 1965. Their line of sailboats expanded producing vessels ranging 19 to 41 feet. Many of these sailboats were designed by talented Swedish designers such a Peter Norlin and Per Brohall.

In 2008, the Albin brand found new life when it was purchased by an American company which led to the creation of a line of powerboats bearing the Albin name.


BOOK CLUB REVIEWS by: Rafael Fernandez

In May we reviewed "Stage Seven" by Ruth F. Stevens, who is a resident of Torrance, California and a good friend of Rosanne Klein, one of our Book Club Members who invited her to attend our book review meeting and which Rossanne moderated expertly, as she also acted as her host. It was a book about the challenges and tragedy experienced by both the individuals suffering from Alzheimer's disease and by the relatives who lovingly must take care of them. At first, it seemed to be a simple story about people taking care of relatives who have developed dementia and loss of memory; and about how, through the process of taking care of them, they reach a new understanding about memory and of how the "cognition functions" of the human brain are "essential" to defining personality. Frankly, I found this story to be more than an intimidating possibility. The idea of loosing the ability of remembering mental action or the process of acquiring knowledge and understanding through, experience, the senses and thought; is simply terrifying!

The book also shines a light on the neurotic behavior and lifestyle that typifies some of our American culture these days, as portrayed by the vividly drawn and distinct cast of characters who almost all have a very unhealthy daily diet: Pizza, sweet bread, processed foods, cookies and cakes; not to mention abuse alcohol and live a very stressful, workaholic lifestyle, including a dependence on highly addictive prescription drugs, like Xanax. The characters all live in a makebelieve land of the *Tropical Gardens*, plastic palm trees and Luau

lunches, where medication is the answer to every problem. Maybe it is a realistic portrayal of some mainstream life, but it also reads as a critique of our contemporary society. Maybe, inadvertently, this book makes the link between the American lifestyle and chronic diseases, such as obesity, diabetes, heart disease and dementia. Each stereotypical character is, to some degree, neurotic as illustrated by the hysterical response to the discovery of a romance between the elderly principal characters; especially by the 20-year-old grandson, who regularly gets "laid" and gets "wasted" in an alcoholic binge... Seems like an unjust reaction, to say the least!
