Leadership

The care and man-

agement of KHYC's docks and yards fall under the Rear Commodore's Flag. These areas are vital to our club's functionality and aesthetics, and I extend my gratitude to the dedicated members that volunteer each year in the positions that help monitor and maintain them. This work is ongoing and time-intensive but ensures that KHYC continues to be a place of pride and enjoyment for all members.

Many yacht clubs do not have the extensive docks and dry moorage amenities that we are fortunate to have. To ensure these facilities are used properly and fairly, I will highlight a few key sections of the KHYC Policy Book relevant to the docks and yards.

1. Logbook

All vessels whether docked, or parked temporarily at KHYC, must register in the Logbook by their owners upon arrival. The Logbook is on the desk at the club entrance on the north side of the clubhouse. Trailered vessels or trailers cannot be left overnight without the Port Captain's approval and Logbook registration. The 2025 Port Captain is S/C Lisa Falk.

2. Dry Moorage License Agreement & Documentation

Members with a dry moorage license must submit a newly signed license agreement yearly, along with current insurance and registration. All vessels and trailers in licensed spaces must be listed on the agreement and have a KHYC ID sticker affixed in a visible location.

3. Yard Cleanliness and Usage

- KHYC dry moorage is not for storing unused or inoperable vessels.
- Please keep your assigned space clean and free of prohibited items, such as bicycles and storage containers other than a dock box. Bicycles must be

parked in one of the KHYC provided bike racks while visiting the club. Overnight bicycle storage is not permitted anywhere on KHYC property.

If you no longer use your vessel that is assigned a dry moorage space, please consider vacating the space to accommodate members on the waitlist that regularly use their vessels.



In January we reviewed "West With Giraffes" by Lynda Rutledge. An emotional, spiritually stirring novel, inspired by the incredible true story of two giraffes who made headlines and won the hearts of Depression-era America. Woodrow Wilson Nickel, age 105, feels his life ebbing away while living in a home for the Elderly. But when he learns giraffes are going extinct, he finds himself recalling the unforgettable experience he cannot take to his grave: "Few true friends have I known and two were giraffes" wrote Woodrow, as he was recalling his life changing adventure while writing the notes that generated this book.



It was 1938 and the Great Depression was lingering. Hitler was threatening Europe, and world-weary Americans were longing for wonder. They found it in two giraffes who miraculously survived a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic. What followed was a twelve-day road trip in a custom truck to deliver Southern California's first giraffes to the San Diego Zoo. Behind the wheel was the young Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow Wilson Nickel. Inspired by true events, the story weaves real-life figures with fictional ones, including the world's first female zoo director, a crusty old man with a past, a young female photographer with a secret, and assorted reprobates as spotty as the giraffes. Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, West with Giraffes explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it was too late - Said Lake

Union Publishing on the book cover.

Personally, as an ex dog "owner" of Alexander (The Grate-Dane), I totally related to Woodrow's feelings for the giraffes and of the giraffes for him: "the grace of animals". It reminded me of how, after my 13 year old dog "Alex" died, it took me years before I had the strength to throw away his metal leash which I kept hanging behind one of my closet doors... Every time I opened that door I heard the "jingle" of the leash and my mind would flash back to Alex's happy brown eyes looking at me when he heard that jingle, knowing that we were going for a walk and "a chat" in Central Park... He really was my friend!

Meanwhile the upcoming reviews schedule stands as follows:

BLAST FROM THE PAST!

This is a 1962 race chart for the King Harbor Yacht Club Cecil R. King Race, an inverted-start race using the Portsmouth handicap rating system run by KHYC in the early days of the yacht club's history. This was graciously provided by member Carroll Whitney, the first Secretary of the Club in 1960.

In 1985, the KHYC Board of Directors accepted and approved the Deed of Gift for the "Neal Anderson Perpetual Trophy For Junior Racing In The Cecil R. King Race." From the Deed of Gift, "This trophy is dedicated in memory of Neal Anderson who spent countless hours in handicap data collection and analyses to provide fair competition in local and national Portsmouth handicap events. Neal was especially admired by the young sailors at King Harbor Yacht Club and their interest inspired the establishment of this trophy." From 1981 to 2006, the Cecil R. King Regatta was actively raced by juniors. The names of the junior sailors who won the regatta can still be found on the perpetual trophy in the clubhouse downstairs. After 2006, the deed of gift was updated to encourage junior sailors to participate in the current KHYC inverted start race using the Portsmouth rating system. The trophy is now the "Neal Anderson/Cecil R. King Perpetual First to Finish Juniors Tom Collier Regatta for Hope," the current Cure Cancer Cup for the Tom Collier Memorial Trophy.
