Four days later was the 4th of July BBQ party at our club, which I hear was attended by over 300 people. Amazing! I've heard rave reviews on the food and the band.

The third was our annual Tom Collier Memorial Cure Cancer Regatta. So much appreciation to Tracey McMartin, Kelly McMartin, Mark Folkman, Mark Hansen, and the entire committee for driving this truly wonderful event. Meanwhile, let's acknowledge, that we are a "private" club, and "Private Yacht Club" can have the aura of exclusivity, and well (snootiness). We of course know that is not true of KHYC, but it is hard to overcome these stereotypes. So what is our value to the community? First, we are a private club in the way that a gym is a private club. Running a club with assets, operating expenses, etc. Needs a way to pay for these expenses, so membership fees are how we do this. The reality is that anyone could join KHYC, at least anyone who expresses an interest in boating. We are a member benefit organization, meaning all income goes to support the physical club and its operations. Private club? Yes, but not an "exclusive, snooty" private club. Beyond the private aspect, so much of what we do is in fact open for public benefit. All our Thursday night racing events as well as all our other regattas are open for sailors to enter whether they're members or not. One of our biggest events, the Christmas parade, is visible and open to anyone who comes down to the waterfront that night. This event will only get bigger and wider with the addition of the Surf Club, Riviera Mexican Cantina, and other marina business. Also, very importantly, KHYC is the parent of the King Harbor Youth Foundation, a 501c3 organization that lives in our facility footprint. This organization is in fact open to all community kids, members or not. We teach all the kids in the South Bay how to sail, how to become responsible boaters, and how to become leaders. We host 5 + local High School sailing teams, including Redondo Union High School. We also provide free access to boating to disadvantaged children across Southern California through the New Channels program. These are real programs benefiting the City of Redondo Beach and all the surrounding communities. Finally, the Yacht Club and the Youth Foundation are both not-for-profit organizations who exist exclusively in the King Harbor Marina. All our hopes and dreams for the future are here. Nowhere else. This makes King Harbor Yacht Club and King Harbor Youth Foundation ideal partners with the City of Redondo Beach, to make our Harbor a better, safer, more vibrant and exciting destination. Let's make sure the citizens know that! This is how we win: Great people, great neighbors, great community leaders - KHYC!

Meanwhile speaking of appreciation for all the race participants who enjoyed the the race format of the Tom Collier Cup Regatta zig-zagging over two courses and having a great time, let us remember that the SoCal 300 from Santa Barbara to San Diego was a big boat offshore race, just as important and a part of the California Offshore Race Week that started from San Francisco. With a TP52 (and with our own KHYC member, Ted Winer as crew) and Rio 100 as some of the fleet, the lone KHYC boat was Kanani, a J/100 skippered by David Bew. 28 boats participated. We doublehanded that race which took us 2 days 4 hours 25 minutes and 6 seconds. The route took us from Santa Barbara, through the slot between Santa Cruz and Santa Rosa Islands, to a point about 10 nm west of Cortes Bank then to the finish at the entrance to San Diego channel. Whales, dolphin, sea lions, mola molas, by-thewind-sailors were abound. We ran into a large patch of kelp which brought us to a stop. Taking down the headsail and backing down with the mainsail pushed out was a chore which cost us half an hour. We were 2nd to the winner in our class by only 37 minutes and they had a crew of 7! Tip to everyone, carry a spare engine belt with you!

I saw a lot of SoCal 300 racers with SB2KH hats so don't forget to register for the 51st Santa Barbara to King Harbor Race on July 26. The early discount deadline is July 7. Roy Disney's Pyewacket entered just after registration was open and we have lots of big boats coming our way. We have a new finish line configuration right off the Club so you can watch the finish on the big screen with YB Tracker and from the warmth and comfort from our fabulous view on our Upper Deck!

Cure Cancer Cup Sailboat Regatta Raises \$28,000 for Research Lab

Thirty-three (33) sailboats, ranging from 20 feet to 40 feet, all sailed together in a 'pursuit race', competing for the Tom Collier Memorial Trophy. Tom Collier passed away due to cancer, at age 31. Impressively, he continued to sail competitively throughout his treatments. His fellow sailors established this regatta in his honor, to support research to cure the disease. This was the 32nd annual sailing of the event, hosted by King Harbor Yacht Club. Since its inception, this regatta has raised over \$780,000 for cancer research. The proceeds all go directly to research activities at a lab in Cedars-Sinai, which has now been named after the event.

In such a 'pursuit race', with a wide range of sailboat types, the slowest boats start first, and the fastest boats start last – the first boat to the finish line wins! The fastest boat started almost one hour after the slowest boat, and after 10 miles of racing, the first boat finished just 27 seconds ahead of the second place boat! The entire course could be viewed from the upper deck of the KHYC clubhouse, where the spectators were treated to a final downwind leg, aimed straight at the clubhouse windows, with the boats flying large colorful 'spinnaker' sails. The awards party included appetizers, a taco bar, and live music. The festivities were highlighted by a silent auction, a spirited live auction and, of course, the trophy awards. Numerous local businesses and individuals generously contributed auction items. Various local collegiate and professional sports teams donated great game packages. The perpetual trophy is a beautiful dolphin sculpture by the artist Wyland, which was awarded to Richard Benner and his crew, Frank Overbeek, aboard their 20-foot catamaran, "Smilemaker".jorth

In July we reviewed "Astor" by Anderson Cooper and Katherine Howe. A New York Times Best Selling Book that describes the wealth divide of the Gilded Age with that of modern day America, or actually of the modern day Western World, because the story takes place both in New York city and London. With this book Anderson Cooper is back with another historical biography fresh on the heels of his best-selling book *Vanderbilt*, about another immensely influential and perplexing wealthy American family.


In United States history, the Gilded Age is described as the period from about the late 1860s to the early 1900s, which occurred between the Reconstruction Era and the Progressive Era. It was named by 1920s historians after an 1873 Mark Twain novel published during the Reconstruction Era. Historians saw the late 19th-century economic expansion as a time of rapid of materialistic excesses marked by widespread political corruption. It was a time of rapid economic growth, especially in the Northern and Western United States. As American wages grew much higher than those in Europe, especially for skilled workers, an industrialization demanded an increasingly skilled labor force, the period saw an influx of millions of European immigrants. The rapid expansion of industrialization led to real wage growth of 40% from 1860 to 1890 and spread across the increasing labor force. The average annual wage per industrial worker (including men, women, and children) rose from \$380 in

1880 (\$11,998 in 2023 dollars) to \$584 in 1890 (\$19,126 in 2023 dollars), a gain of 59%. But the Gilded Age was also an era of poverty, and growing inequality (especially in the South), where millions of immigrants poured into the United States, and the high concentration of wealth became more visible and contentious throughout the country -Wikipedia.

The story of the Astors is a perfectly typical American story - of ambition, invention, destruction, and reinvention. Lasting from 1783, when a German immigrant John Jacob Langhanke (not Astor, yet) first arrived in the United States. In 2009, his descendant, Anthony Marshall, was convicted of defrauding his elderly mother... *Astor*, was a made-up name, chosen to start with an "A" so that in a future document the name would be one of the first on the page and would occupy a unique place in American society. The family fortune, first made by a beaver trapping business that grew into an empire, was then amplified by slum holdings in Manhattan real estate. Over the ensuing generations, the Astors ruled Gilded Age New 1016 Society and Inches selves into political and cultural life, but also suffered the most famous loss on the Titanic, october twists in the family's story. In this unconventional, page-turning historical biography, we also get a glimpse onto the making of America itself.
